This trail was created in cooperation with the Academy and links it with one of the main attractions of the Hunsrück-Hochwald national park: the Celtic rampart of Otzenhausen.



Creation & Commitment

In 1994, representatives of the International Federation of Europe Houses (FIME) founded the Arboretum Europaeum and planted 40 trees from all over Europe. Following in this tradition, partner organisations or close friends of the Academy have been sponsoring trees up to this day.

Its present name "Arboretum Europaeum – Sustainability Park" refers to one of the most important educational initiatives of the Academy and its partners in recent times: "Encouraging sustainability". The Arboretum is not the only example for the commitment of the Academy. It also takes part in the environmental pact Umweltpakt Saar (valid 2018) and continuously improves its environmental management.

Hunsrück & Hochwald

The European Academy of Otzenhausen is located in the close vicinity of the Hunsrück-Hochwald national park, which was founded in 2015 and accommodates many animal and plant communities worthy of protection. Already prior to its creation, its unique feature "Celtic heritage" in addition to the important forest ecosystem had found its expression in the programme of the Academy. The Academy is an official partner of the national park (valid 2018) and maintains close cooperation.

Here, in the Schwarzwälder Hochwald region, beech, oak and spruce forests dominate the landscape. A part of this area which has been inhabited for over 2,500 years, has now been given back to nature.
